

## Birdwood Parade Bushland

Have you seen the local pinnacles? These limestone outcrops can still be seen on the steep slopes. The bushland at Birdwood Parade has an elevated position that offers views of the Swan River, Kings Park and Perth City. The parkland areas adjacent to Birdwood Parade contain many significant habitat trees such as Marri's and Jarrahs.

## Mason's Garden

Western Long-neck Turtles, also known as Oblongs are rapidly declining in suburban lakes around Perth. Dog and raven attacks as well as declining rainfall are playing havoc with their numbers. These carnivorous creatures play an important role in controlling mosquito infestations as their hatchlings love eating the little wrigglers. Keeping dogs on leads near wetlands is one way to help to protect them.

## Claremont Park

Claremont Park, located in the Town of Claremont adjoins the Council Offices on Stirling Highway. Take a break and enjoy the shade of the wonderful old indigenous trees where birdlife abounds in the treetops. After crossing Stirling Highway, you enter the shopping precinct, and pass the Claremont Hotel. Following the markers will link you up with Rowe Park and the Yange Kep Bidi intersecting point.

## Karrakatta Cemetery

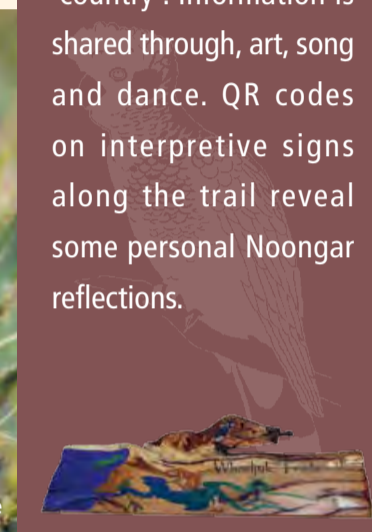
Karrakatta Cemetery first opened for burials in 1899 and has Monuments and headstones bearing many famous names. These include those of university founders, writers and historians, state premiers and other auspicious individuals. Enjoy the walk through the stately stands of cypress trees a hallmark of Karrakatta, that preside over beautiful garden areas in the historic heart of the cemetery.

## Hollywood Reserve

Originally a Dairy farm, the reserve was once planted with various foreign grasses. Large trees from World War II were felled by soldiers from the nearby hospital as part of their therapy and rehabilitation, and these can still be seen. The reserve offers an almost circular walk via the Bill Day path presenting a wonderful opportunity to view a vast array of wildflowers especially pretty during the spring.

## Noongar Significance

The Karak Bidi (Carnaby's Cockatoo Trail) includes views of the entrancing Swan River (Derbal Yarigan) Noongar translation. This highly significant river is woven into the dreaming stories and song lines of the local Aboriginal people, the Noongar. Their culture is characterised by a strong spiritual connection to 'country'. Information is shared through, art, song and dance. QR codes on interpretive signs along the trail reveal some personal Noongar reflections.

### History of the Trail

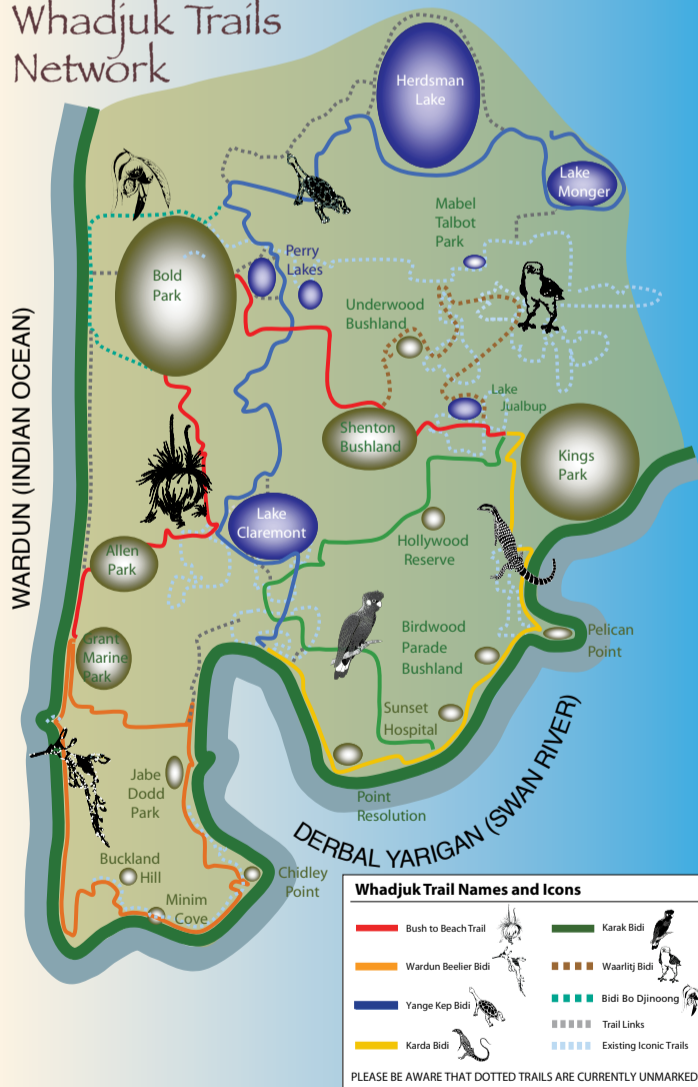
Western Suburbs bushland walks were initiated in 2002 by Friends groups to link remnant bushlands in Perth's Western Suburbs. It was their vision to run a series of annual walks along sections of the trails to encourage the community to use and appreciate their local bushland areas. The Karak Bidi is 11.3km and links parks and bushland areas with the Swan River, Iconic and Heritage Trails. Due to numerous access points, the route can be walked in sections, allowing all to enjoy the diverse landscape.

### Map Options

- A free APP is available for download for iPhone or Android providing a clearly-mapped off-line route.
- Great audio guides are available with QR codes on your smart phone.
- A Google map option is available for a large variety of phones, or can be printed from the webpage.
- Trails are marked with triangular directional signage inserted into paths and bollards.

## Hollywood Reserve

This remnant bushland contains a mixture of non-indigenous and native species offering a stunning array of wildflowers. It is home to wildlife including Black Cockatoos and Monitor Lizards.

Listen for the noisy Red-eye Wattle with its definitive red wattles. This is the largest of the honey eaters. Poorly built nests result in high infant mortality.
